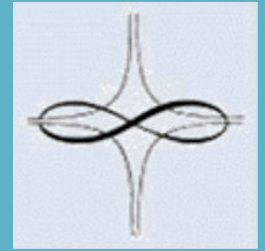

A Report from a Recipient of a St Vincent Pallotti Scholarship

(From Wagga Wagga Diocese)

I had been looking into studying music, as a university subject, towards the end of year twelve. My music teacher was consistently pushing me towards the course. The one thing that had made me sceptical about the course had been whether I could justify the price I would have to pay for this specific education. I was still encouraged to apply and with a lot of support from my family, I did. I also began to take a more active role in St Michael's Cathedral's Choir and parish life in general. I was in the process of applying for the university when I heard about the St Vincent Pallotti Scholarship. The Cathedral administrator, at the time, encouraged me to apply, knowing that I had been thinking about studying music, and had mentioned that the degree could be useful not only to me, but to the Cathedral as well. I was immediately interested and with the help of my family and a few good spiritual directors, I applied. With all the support, moral and financial, that had come from the Church and my family, I knew that this must be in line with my vocation. It was truly an honour to be accepted as it gave me a boost of confidence that not only was I on the right track, but I would also have plenty of support to keep me on it.

Over the year of studying music, I was able to learn skills and techniques that helped me to assist the choir in getting back on its feet. During Covid, the choir had all but disappeared, with so many guidelines to adhere to, it was decided it was best to dissolve the choir, for the time being. Thanks to a few encouraging priests and the support of my family, who I could always count on to sing even if no one else could make it, it became my responsibility, with the guiding wisdom of a couple of organists, to rejuvenate the choir and raise the Cathedral's music to a quality fit for its large sandstone walls. Over the year a great deal of recruiting was done, choristers were lost and found, but ultimately God provided and the 10am Mass was almost always adorned with voices.

The Easter Triduum, the pinnacle of the liturgical year was glorious, particularly the Easter Vigil, every psalm, and the alleluia, were sung by a new cantor (3 out of 5 having their first chance to sing a solo from the lectern), and enthusiasm affected every voice for all the hymns resulting in countless compliments for weeks after Holy week. "The choir hasn't sounded that good at an Easter Mass for years!" The Christmas Masses, another major event in the Catholic Calendar, were also a highlight at the Cathedral last year, with all the gusto that singing carols is bound to encourage.

Through my studies I was given the confidence to run rehearsals, train the choristers to be more confident, and hopefully learn a thing or two about music and singing, choose repertoire, (again with the help of the organists), and make sure the music would fit seamlessly into the liturgy. The course also offered a music history unit that gave me a greater understanding and appreciation for music in the Church. Knowing that Catholics were among the first to notate music, particularly music for the Mass, really helped me to understand just how important it is in our liturgy; that music so carefully preserved, should not be thrown away too easily.

As someone who grew up singing in the Cathedral children's choir, and watched it fall apart with no one to run it, it became my goal to get it up and running. I really hope to make it flourish this year by talking to schools and gaining more interest after Mass.

I'm grateful for the opportunity to have studied Music with the support of the St Vincent Pallotti Scholarship. By supporting me, the scholarship acknowledges the importance of Music in the Liturgy, particularly in our Cathedral. It meant so much to me that the board would consider someone so young for such an influential scholarship. It is encouraging to see people my age being supported in their attempts to make the Church a more beautiful and welcoming place. I can't wait to see how the choir and I will grow, making the liturgy glorious and continuing to praise God for all we're worth.

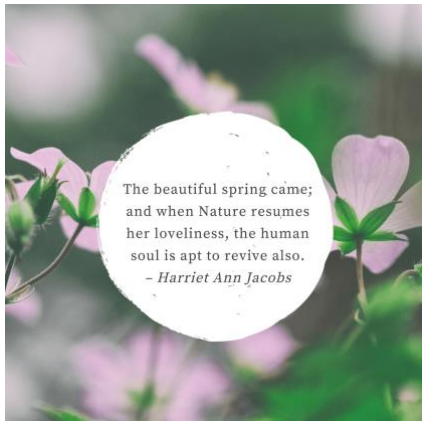

UAC-ARM

UAC-ARM is a Pallottine Family missionary outreach group in Australia. We engage in different activities both in Australia and overseas.

Flamme D'Amour Orphanage – Keshero – Democratic Republic of Congo (DRC).

Flamme D'Amour Orphanage is a small non-government facility in Keshero DRC. Keshero sits very close to the border of Rwanda and is a suburb in the region of Goma.

The orphanage, established by Sister Alvera Gahinyuza, cares for vulnerable children, women and other vulnerable people who have been affected by the different wars in the Eastern Congo region. At the orphanage in Keshero there are 96 children, 60 boys and 36 girls. In total the organisation cares for 165 children. Of the total number, 113 are primary school age and 52 attend secondary school.

As a Pallottine Family in Australia we have supported the orphanage since 2016. The support has primarily been regular donations towards the cost of food, certainly not enough to provide for all of the nutritional needs of the children, but a contribution towards the cost.

Other donations have enabled: Water from the Mains System to be linked to the orphanage, purchase of chickens, rabbits and goats to assist with increasing the children's protein intake and assisting with the cost of education and medical care. If you are able to assist with a donation towards the costs associated with providing support for the children, the bank details are below. Your donation may either be a one-off payment or perhaps a monthly amount.

Cheryl Sullivan had hoped to visit the orphanage on her way home from the Congress in Rome but was advised that it wouldn't be safe to do so. Fighting is continuing near Goma, the Capital City near Keshero.

Sr Alvera, recently wrote to Cheryl: *Hello Cherly, thank you very much for your message. So in these days we have three orphanages. The first is in the city of Goma which was created in January 2008, the second is in the area of Masisi in the Parish of Nyakariba which was created in 2010 and the last is in Rutshuru which was created in February 2024. For the two centers of Goma and Nyakariba the centers are built on our plots. While for the center of Rutshuru we rent a house with the aim of buying a plot for them. Please continue to pray for us. Prayer the key to UAC Congress success, says President

Prayer is the most powerful spiritual tool available in seeking God’s blessings on the Union of Catholic Apostolate (UAC) and the fourth UAC General Congress to be held in Rome this month, the international leader of the Pallottine Family said recently.



Fr Jacob Nampudakam, the President of the UAC, quoted Pope Francis as saying that the prayer of the humble person was the

“weakness” of God. “The Lord is weak only in this one sense. He is weak before the prayers of His people,” Fr Nampudakam quoted the Pope as saying. Fr Jacob was preaching at a Eucharist held in preparation for the Congress on 19 June at the Church of San Salvatore in Onda, Rome, where St Vincent Pallotti’s body lies at rest.

He said there were many practical things and much hard work to do to ensure a successful Congress. “However, we realise that the most powerful spiritual tool before us is prayer for the blessings of God for the Union and for the Congress in particular.” He also quoted St John Chrysostom that “prayer is the place of refuge for every worry, a foundation for cheerfulness, a source of constant happiness, a protection against ih”.

Fr Jacob was one of three UAC leaders to attend a meeting of moderators and delegates of the Associations and Ecclesial Movements on 13 June at which Pope Francis spoke of three “synodal virtues that can derive from a spiritual conversion: thinking as God thinks, overcoming exclusiveness and cultivating humility”.

Fr Jacob said “ecclesial movements are meant to serve the Church, they are not a message in themselves, an ecclesial centrality”. “They are for service.

“May the UAC General Congress be an occasion to relive and celebrate this spirit and charism of St. Vincent in great humility, always in service of the People of God.

The theme for the Congress, to be held from 25-31 July, is “With Christ, our hope, we set out again together with joy and hope renewed”. This comes from Luke’s Gospel account of the encounter between two disciples and Jesus on the road to Emmaus and of their despair turning to hope and joy when they realised that their companion was the Risen Lord.

Four Australian UAC members will attend the Congress: UAC National Coordination Council, President Mary Whiting; her predecessor, Cheryl Sullivan; UAC Australia Prayer Promoter, Anne Dowling and Mark Brolley, who succeeded Cheryl on the General (international) Coordination Council in 2022. Perth's Tricia Wisolith has also served on the GCC, which is the international equivalent of the NCC for Australia and the Local Coordination Councils based in Victoria and WA.

General Coordination Council Meeting 2024

Fr Jacob will chair the annual face-to-face meeting of the GCC straight after the Congress. The four-day meeting will include a review of the Congress and consider a significant year ahead for the Pallottine Family as well as the wider Church.



Pope Francis has announced a Holy Year for 2025, inspired by the theme "Pilgrims of Hope". Next year, the Pallottine Family will also celebrate special anniversaries: the 175th anniversary of St Vincent Pallotti's death and the 200th anniversary of the only Jubilee he experienced and in which he was heavily involved.

The world leader of the Pallottine Fathers and Brothers, Fr Zenon Hanas, wrote to Fr Jacob that it was important now to make the members of the Pallottine congregations and the whole Union aware of this great and important jubilee event.

The Pallottine Jubilee, also centred on Rome, will begin on 9 January 2025 and end on 22 January 2026, the Solemnity of the Founder.

The 60th Anniversary of Fr Pat's ordination to the Priesthood 25th of July 1964 - 2024

*For all that Has Been – Thanks!
And to all that will be –Yes!*

Thanks to my parents and my family, for the warmth, personal support, sense of teamwork and work in the service of God and others. And thanks to so many wonderful people with whom I have shared my ministry.

I was born in Ayr, Scotland, with my twin, Michael, January 30th, 1936, to mum and dad and the other

four children (eight in all) in the family. We were not well off, but my parents were very resourceful and each of us were encouraged to work together. Dad leased a plot of land of eight acres and from an early age we worked with him on Saturdays and holiday times, selling our produce, and raised enough money to emigrate to Australia.

We came as migrants on the Orion P&O Line and arrived in Melbourne 15th January 1951, greeted by our brother John, whom mum and dad sent out to put a deposit on a house in Pascoe Vale. It was hot but we walked to Blessed Oliver Plunkett's, our new parish, for Sunday Mass. The Pallottine Fathers were on supply to the parish priest Fr Tom Keogh, and to the parish. Almost immediately we took apprenticeships, me in carpentry and Michael as a bricklayer. After a couple of years, we joined the Pallottine groups in Kew on Friday nights.

In his 3rd year, Michael was inspired by Walter Silvester to become a Pallottine and go to our house of studies in Strathfield, Sydney. I came two years later after finishing my five years' apprenticeship. Jesus, the carpenter, wanted joiners, so I joined. I am thankful to my parents and Michael for calling me, for the Lecturers and the creative community of nine young Pallottines with whom I shared the nine years in formation. I thank God for the spirituality and life of St Vincent Pallotti which shaped my life.

I was ordained in St Patrick's, Melbourne by Archbishop Symonds, 25th July 1964. It seemed my life was destined to be chaplain to the lay missionary building teams in the Kimberly mission, but I thank Fr Silvester who sent me to a two-year full-time Leadership Training course 1965. It was a great relief! It allowed me to unleash my creative imagination in 1967, in youth camps begun by Fr Gerhard Christoph at Pallotti College. After one year Gerhard went to Tardun mission in W.A. and during studies I said Mass on Sundays and started monthly folk Nights in the firelight and candlelight of Kew with professional musicians.

Besides youth camps I conducted retreats for male and female school students. During the May, September Christmas holidays the focus was on creative camps. Together with young and older lay leaders we planned, ran and evaluated a variety of camps: Two for 8-12 year-old boys, Adventure camps, and Mixed Arts camps for 16-17 year olds, all co-ed. And a week-end camp for 18 years upwards, run by my brother, Michael who was teaching our students in the College at Millgrove. After seven years I gained a Churchill Scholarship to study Youth formation programs in America, Europe and Britain for five months.

When I returned in 1972 the leaders wanted a more committed involvement, so we began a Young adult community and called it: The Cenacle Young Adult Community. It expressed Vincent Pallotti's vision of Priest, Religious and Lay people called to be apostles, equal in ministry to youth and families, living together and committed for a two-years; Pallotti College had shifted its focus to Marriage and Adult retreats. After six years I was appointed assistant to Fr John Luemmen in Riverton Parish, Perth, 1978-83 which extended my experience with youth to ministry and sacramental programs with adults and families.

I went to Iona College, New Rochelle, NY, in 1983-5 for a 3 year M.D course in Pastoral Counselling and a 2 year course in spirituality and Spiritual Direction. I stayed in the parish of Sacred Heart, Hartsdale, and studied at the College. It was a time of reflection and enrichment in many areas of my priestly life.

When I came home I was put in charge of our house of formation in Box Hill, 1985. Fr Roger McGinley invited Sr Joy Shelley, a Canossian nun, to stay with us. She was a great associate who brought a wealth of experience to the work we did. We also trained Lay Missionaries for our Tardun, W.A. mission.

With Br Lindsay, our students took part in a shared diocesan students and religious male and female novices formation 1985 -1999 as well as our own specific Pallottine program.

In 2000 to complete the Pallottine Formation Program I studied for a D. MinStud. degree with the Theme: "Barrier to Intimacy or Path to Love? A Journey towards Celibacy of Young Adult Male Religious" with gratitude to my supervisor Dr Maryanne Confoy R.S.C.

Finally, in June 2001 I was appointed Parish Priest to St Christopher's Syndal, to build on the wonderful work of Fr John Hennessy and Fr John Flynn and Br Kevin Clarke 2001-2019, a wonderful parish and school with Sr Joy Shelley developing a thriving Sunday School program and other small creative spirituality groups. Fr Ralph continued to grow the parish, and Br Lindsay and I went to [85 Studley Park Rd](#), Kew, with Fr Joe Butscher as rector. The Mariana Community were a great support as well as the parishioners of St Christopher's and St Anthony's.

On the death of Fr Joe, Kew was sold, and Br Lindsay and I went to St Anthony's Glen Huntly with grateful thanks to Fr Leenus for making us so welcome.

For all that has been, I thank God for that small push from Fr Walter and how God has opened doors through 60 years of my priesthood as I tried to follow Jesus, guided by Mary Queen of Apostles and St Vincent Pallotti. And for the undeserved grace of sharing Jesus' priesthood in service to all those that God sent into my life.

For all that lies ahead, I gladly say yes.
